Dear Parishioners and Friends

With Fr Boniface returning to Douai Abbey at the end of the week a few people have asked me what an abbey or monastery is. Not an unusual question!

If we go back to the fourth century, we can see how monastic life developed. St Antony of Egypt wished to take the teaching of Jesus seriously, sold everything he owned and went off into the desert to be alone with God. His day would have been spent in prayer, study of the Scriptures and just keeping himself alive. Gradually, other men were inspired by his way of life and joined him. Women too formed groups of like-minded women and they also lived alone but then in communities, taking to heart the words of Jesus, 'Where two or three gather in my name, I am there in their midst.' Monastic life flourished throughout the middle ages.

After the Reformation in our islands, three monasteries of English monks were set up in France, the monastery that Fr Boniface and I come from being one of them. Douai Abbey is now at Woolhampton, near Newbury in Berkshire. There is a long monastic tradition of monks leaving their monasteries to work away from home for particular reasons. A great example of this for us is Pope St Gregory the Great, himself a monk. He lived in the latter part of the sixth century, and sent another monk, called Augustine, to England to bring Christianity to the Angles.

In penal times English Benedictine monks who were priests would come secretly to our shores to minister to Catholics and many were caught and executed. When persecution of Catholic priests ceased Benedictines would be sent from their monasteries to work in 'parishes' in various parts of the country. That is how Benedictine priests have served the parish of St Anne's, Ormskirk, since before 1732.

Today, some of the Douai monks still work away from home. When Boniface returns to Douai he will be joining our brothers in the resident community. We all 'muck in' together! The round of prayer commences at 0615 till breakfast at 0830. We then get on with our jobs till prayer before lunch and there is usually much to do in the afternoons till we gather at 6pm for Vespers, our evening prayer. The final prayer together, Compline, is at 8pm.

Fr Boniface will not be going home to strangers! The Community is ready to welcome him back after his 12 years 'away from home'. He will be greatly missed in the parish and I am sure he is sad to be leaving. But I know we shall all be in his prayers.



 After he was healed Bartimaeus followed Jesus along the road. Help Bartimaeus follow Jesus along the path to eternal life.


