Dear Parishioners & Friends

Monday 11 July is the feast of St Benedict so it is worth saying a few words about the Patron of Europe, and a saint whose influence on our parish has been immense.

Born in Nursia, Italy, about the year 480AD he was sent to Rome to study when he was 18. The Roman Empire was coming to an end and Benedict was horrified at the decadence which he found there. He left to go and live as a hermit in the mountains of Subiaco not far from Rome. He quickly accrued a reputation for holiness, and other hermits asked him to be their leader. They didn't like the structures he introduced so attempted to poison Benedict; thank goodness they failed! He left Subiaco and went to Monte Cassino where he was joined by many other young men, who like him, were sincerely seeking God. They all lived, prayed and worked as a community and it was while at Monte Cassino that Benedict wrote his rule for monks, a guide for those intent on dedicating their lives to God and trying their best to follow the teachings of Jesus. Given the central role that Benedictine monasteries played throughout Europe in the Middle Ages, the Rule of St Benedict is one of the most influential documents in western civilization.

The Rule deals with all aspects of community living. Why do those in monastic life (men and women) join a monastery? To seek God. As one writer said, 'Monastics have a fascination with God'. What structures help this quest? Commitment to the life of the community under a wise and holy superior called The Abbot. The heart of community life? Prayer, both formal and personal, based on The Word of God. In our monastery at Douai Abbey, we usually spend nearly 4 hours in prayer every day – and it is not boring!

St Benedict outlines the spiritual and human qualities necessary for monastic life: the role of silence, humility, how members of the community relate and care for one another, how outsiders are to be welcomed; and a key word is the very first word in the Rule, 'Listen'.

Monasteries are places of prayer and welcome, of learning and culture. Academics and artisans all have equal standing in the community. Today, diverse individuals and groups have found these sound principles of working together and living together relevant to their lives. Let me know if you would like a copy of the Rule of St Benedict!

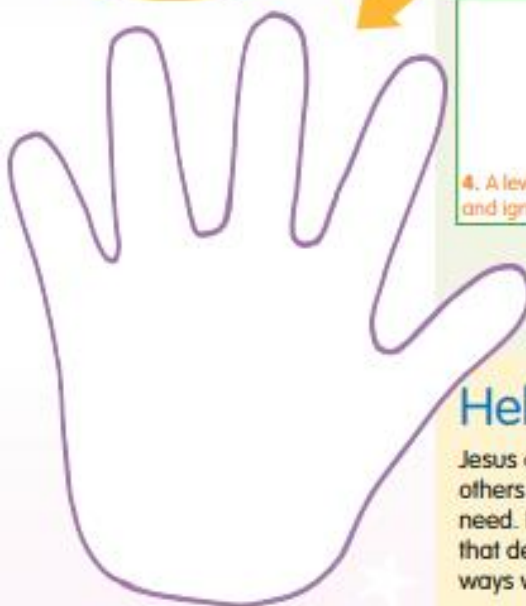
